

a Note From Pastor andrea

Dear Members and Friends Here at Diamond Lake Lutheran,

We did it! By an overwhelming majority vote, we are now a Reconciling in Christ congregation, explicitly open to and affirming of God's beloveds of all sexual orientations and gender identities and expressions.

We did it. And, we're not done yet!

One of the very first things I noticed when I walked into the Sanctuary, when I was still in the interview process for this call, was the chancel window – the big one straight ahead as you walk in – where a brown Jesus stands on a rainbow.

I wondered if you knew how lucky you were, to have this historically accurate depiction of a Palestinian man standing high and tall in the midst of a country so rife with white supremacy, while so many congregations explore costly fixes to the white stained-glass Jesuses in their sanctuaries.

I wondered if it was reflective of who you were already, or if it was an aspirational window in that regard, both the brown Jesus and the rainbow.

I soon came to realize what one of our newer members shared with me recently – that in many ways, we seemed more like an RIC congregation than so many RIC congregations she had already tried on for size, only to end up at Diamond Lake Lutheran, which felt to her more open and welcoming than anyplace else, even without the official designation.

Kudos to the RIC team, for leading us so carefully through this faith-filled process. Kudos to the entire congregation, for your willingness and determination to create the widest welcome possible, and for understanding why "all are welcome" doesn't quite cut it. And kudos to the LGBTQIA+ members of our community who have been here all along, living out your faith as a testimony to the full lives God wants for every last one of us.

And. Now that the vote is behind us, now that we can put the RIC logo on our website and in our bulletins, now that we can post our welcome statement in the Commons for everyone to see...now we continue to live like we mean it.

We continue to live like the church that's had a brown Jesus standing on a rainbow in their chancel window since 1952, we continue to live like the church that felt more welcoming even before this designation than some that have had it for decades, we continue to live with the humility and wonder and questions of a community always looking to learn more about how to make more and better space for God's beloveds.

What good news, dear friends. What a privilege it is to serve among you.

Each Monday evening, individuals and families are welcomed at New Creations to receive nutritious groceries and essential supplies in a caring and respectful environment. With grocery costs continuing to rise, this ministry plays a critical role in

ensuring that families have consistent access to healthy food.

New Creations relies on the generosity of volunteers and donors to sustain its mission. Your financial gifts this month will help purchase holiday turkeys and fund needed van repairs, ensuring the ministry can continue picking up food donations from area grocery stores.

How To Support the Work of Every Meal

Every Meal works to combat the weekend food gap, when children facing food insecurity aren't able to receive school meals. At the end of each week, Every Meal provides children with 4–5 pounds of substantive, nutritious food. Families may choose from five food bag options tailored to various cultural dietary preferences or situational needs.

We expect approximately 40–45 students at Barton Elementary School will register to receive Every Meal food bags this year. A contribution of \$440 provides one student with enough filled food bags for the entire school year. Any donation, regardless of size, is welcome.

Congregational Vote on Welcome Statement Overwhelmingly Passed

Diamond Lake Lutheran is Now A Reconciling in Christ Congregation

We are delighted to report that after two years of hard work by the RIC team and the entire church, we are officially a Reconciling in Christ congregation! The vote passed at the special congregational meeting on October 12, with 96 yes votes out of 97—an overwhelming 99% approval, well above the 80% goal we had set. As part of this vote, we formally adopted the Welcome Statement printed on this page. A special thank you goes out to the team for guiding the congregation in this process: Lisa Bass, Stacy Klage, Sean Laird, Russ Michaletz, Karen Minge, and John Pedersen. The work has just begun as we now purposefully live out the words of the Welcome Statement for all we meet, both inside and outside of the church walls.

Eloise Miller experiences her faith through her relationships with family and friends and in the beauty of nature around her. Lacy Tooker-Kirkevold has played an important role in her faith journey, guiding her through meaningful education and experiences. Some of Eloise's favorite church memories include participating in the cabaret and youth musical—she loves how everyone who wants a speaking part gets one, and how much fun it is to perform together. She also enjoys the Sermon on the Steps, especially the funny and honest things the younger kids say. For her faith project, Eloise is creating a Blessing Box (also known as a Little Free Pantry) with her grandparents—her grandfather is helping her build it, and her grandmother will help her paint it. Once complete, the box will be placed on the church lawn and filled with shelf-stable food, water, and other necessities for those in need.



Rachel Craig's favorite thing about Diamond Lake Lutheran is the sense of community she's found here. She loves meeting new people, building friendships, and feels her faith strengthened through these connections. Iris M. and Nora K. have been a valuable part of this community, and she's enjoyed being in the musicals with the "older" kids, Avery K., Claire T., and John T. Fond memories include running around as a younger child during Sunday School when the teacher didn't show up, playing Kahoot in confirmation, and participating in performances. Graydon Royce and Bob Kresse have had a meaningful impact on her faith journey through their collaboration with her on musicals and performances. Rachel's favorite parts of worship are the sermon from the pulpit, singing hymns, and participating in Holy Communion. Her faith project will be an oral faith statement on Nov. 2.

What is a Faith Project?

A faith project is a creative and personal milestone for each confirmation student, inviting them to reflect on their individual faith journey. Each project serves as an expression of who they are, what they believe, and how they experience God in their lives. No two projects are alike—some take the form of service work, music, writing, or visual art, while others explore storytelling or community engagement. Through this process, students consider the people and experiences that have shaped their faith and how they hope to live it out in the future. Together, these projects offer a meaningful glimpse into how the youth at Diamond Lake Lutheran Church live out their faith. Lacy has been an important influence at Diamond Lake Lutheran, and he admires the kindness and helpfulness she shows to everyone. A favorite memory for Leo is participating in the Christmas play, and his favorite part of worship is listening to the choir and enjoying the music.

A Week in the Life of the Parish Nurse

The work of a parish nurse blends pastoral care, health education, and community support into one holistic ministry. Every day is different and shifts with the needs of the community. I spend some days preparing for a blood drive, vaccine clinic, or CPR training. Other times, I'm planning programs such as older adult wellness screenings, grief support groups, or health education workshops.

Much of the work extends beyond the church walls and into the lives of parishioners. I visit homebound members to provide checkins, conversation, and practical health support. I also spend time in hospitals, sitting with patients, offering a listening ear, and providing encouragement during difficult moments. These visits help sustain the connection between Diamond Lake Lutheran and those unable to be physically present at the church.

The weekly rhythm of the church also creates natural spaces for connection. On Sundays and Wednesday evenings, I may assist with worship, help with programming, or simply greet people as they arrive. These everyday interactions often open space for health conversations and care that emerge naturally within community life.

Together, these elements reflect the heart of parish nursing: care grounded in relationships. The work adapts with the changing needs of the congregation, but the purpose remains the same—to nurture well-being in body, mind, and spirit.


